St. Asaph Square is about to undergo a large elevator renovation project. There are many project types encountered by associations. Some projects are the routine type, such as maintenance of the building components, while others are larger in scope. The smaller projects usually afford residents the luxury of a predictable, even flow of work, shorter notification periods, completion in less than a week, and many residents and owners don't even know about them because site staff performs work during the day. Larger projects require more planning, usually in multiple phases, and take a longer period of time. The elevator replacement project falls into the latter category. This project will be disruptive to many, and it will be mid-December before it is completed. Please bear with the Association during this inconvenience.

The St. Asaph Square Board of Directors has retained *Atlantic Elevator Consultants* to perform quality control and quality assurance of the upcoming elevator renovation. TKE, (ThyssenKrupp Elevators) is the contractor of choice. There have been many meetings between the Association, the Contractor, and the Engineering Consultants. During the meetings, the Association has emphasized proper work ethic, minimal disruption, and open and constant communication with Management, the Board, and the residents of the buildings. The first elevator to go out of service will be elevator number 1 on the Pitt Street side of the building.

The construction and renovation process will disrupt and disturb some residents. Please bear with the inconvenience. Beginning March 24th, the construction crews will stage

equipment throughout the garage area. This may include, but is not limited to, toolboxes and other construction related materials.

In the upcoming months, there will be a crane on site, most likely on a Saturday, to lift the modernization equipment that will be used in the elevator control rooms into place on the roof. During this time the street will be closed for parking.

Please note that all contractors will be wearing identification badges while they are working in the building. Ingress and egress will be made from the parking garage and the loading dock. The contractors will not be using the lobby entrances.

The project status reports and Gantt charts will be available for viewing on the Association's web page. Please check that site often for updates and progress reports by Management and the Contractor.

The Use of Barbeque Grills

Lots of questions have been asked regarding the use of barbeque grills. There is no better time to talk about it than now, when outdoor grilling is ready to go in full force.

In a memorandum by the then Chief Fire Marshall, Mr. Michael Conner, dated May 24, 1999, responding to a request for information for the use of barbeque grills on balconies in Alexandria, Mr. Corner stated in part:

.....In the event the cooking is done by Liquefied Petroleum Gas, (typically propane), the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standard 58 is the reference standard governing the use of this product in all multi-family dwellings with three or more living units. NFPA 58, section 3-4.9.2 states that, cylinders having a water capacity greater than 2½ pounds shall be prohibited on balconies above first floor in all buildings above three or more balcony units. This requires that the cylinder is limited to 14.7 gallons of liquefied petroleum gas. The average barbeque grill normally comes equipped with a 20 gallon tank, thus prohibited in all multifamily dwellings as defined above.


Mr. Conner further more indicated that most multi-family dwellings in Alexandria, both rentals and condominiums, have complete prohibition of these types of devices because of their insurance carriers' regulations. I am hopeful that this

answers all the questions regarding the use the grills.

For the comfort of the residents, the Association has designated two areas on the deck plaza as grilling areas; the north and south ends of the plaza. It is a BYOG policy. Be sure to label your grill and most importantly, please clean after grilling.

Two Recipes...

...one for cherry-blossom time and and one from St. Asaph Square's very own Master Chef.

Fresh Cherry Crisp



Preheat oven to 375° . In a 9 " pie pan, put in 4 cups of pitted fresh cherries and sprinkle with 2 T. lemon juice. In a bowl, mix very lightly $\frac{1}{4}$ cup flour, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup oatmeal, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup packed brown sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup butter, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt (if butter unsalted), and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. cinnamon. Spread mixture over the cherries and bake for about 30 minutes. Serve hot or cold.

What is the History of the Freedmen's Cemetery?

The Freedmen's Cemetery served as the burial place for about 1,800 African Americans who fled to Alexandria to escape from bondage during the Civil War. They found a safe haven in Alexandria because of the Union occupation, but their large numbers resulted in a refugee crisis. While many found employment, other contrabands, as the freedmen were officially known, were destitute after fleeing slavery, and arrived hungry and in ill health. Many were housed in barracks, and disease was rampant. In 1864, after hundreds had perished, the Superintendent of Contrabands ordered that a property on the southern edge of town, across from the Catholic cemetery, be confiscated for use as a cemetery.

In the first year, burials included those of black soldiers, but African American troops recuperating in Alexandria's hospitals demanded that blacks be given the honor of burial in the Soldiers' Cemetery, now Alexandria National Cemetery. The soldiers' graves were disinterred and moved to the military cemetery in January 1865. The last military burial in Contrabands and Freedmen Cemetery took place in January 1869 but private burials could have continued.

The cemetery fell into disrepair, and a brickyard and railroad cutting encroached on its edges. The cemetery appeared on maps until 1939, but by then there would have been little remaining above-ground evidence of the burials. In 1955, a gas station was built on the property, followed by an office building. More than 30 years later, historical research revealed the presence of the long-forgotten cemetery, and plans for rebuilding the Woodrow Wilson Bridge along the cemetery's southern edge focused attention on it. The Friends of Freedmen's Cemetery was formed to advocate for preservation of the site as a memorial. The layout of the cemetery, revealed by the archaeological work, will be reflected in the design of a memorial park. *Tentative dedication date is Saturday, September 6, 2014.*

- Please ensure that all trash and recycling is placed in the receptacles in the trash rooms and that trash chute rooms are kept free of non-bagged waste.
 Boxes should be flattened before placing in receptacles.

 cycling is in effect. Recyclable material can be placed in the marked recycling bins and does not need to be separated by type as before.
